#### **RECOGNIZING WORD ROOTS**

#### Introduction

In the English language, many words have a "core" section, or root. Consider, for example, the word *prediction*. *Pre-* and *-tion* attach to the root, *-dic-*, which means "say" in Latin. A prediction is something "said before" an event happens.

Some common roots include dark in darkness, sad in sadness, and ground in foreground. You might say that roots are the building blocks of our language. Roots are an important reading and vocabulary tool, because they can help you figure out the meaning of words that are unfamiliar.

Read the passage below from "King Arthur: The Marvel of the Sword" by Mary MacLeod.

Then Uther Pendragon turned and said in hearing of them all: "I give my son Arthur God's blessing and mine, and bid him pray for my soul, and righteously and honorably claim the crown, on forfeiture of my blessing."

And with that, King Uther died.

But Arthur was still only a baby, not two years old, and Merlin knew it would be no use yet to proclaim him King. For there were many powerful nobles in England in those days, who were all trying to get the kingdom for themselves, and perhaps they would kill the little Prince. So there was much strife and debate in the land for a long time.

There are several roots in the above passage. For example, notice the word proclaim. If you are not familiar with a word like proclaim in your reading, see if the word contains a root. In this case, the root of proclaim is claim, which means "to assert." When you see that root together with the prefix pro-, which means "forward" or "before," you can infer that the word proclaim means "to assert in front of the people," or "to announce officially."

On the chart below, you will see how three words from the passage—proclaim, righteously, and honorably— are formed from root words. Notice that righteously is formed from the root right plus two suffixes: -(e)ous, meaning "full of," and -ly meaning "in the manner of." In the same way, honorably is formed from the root honor plus the suffix -able, which means "having qualities of," and the suffix -ly.





## PREFIXES/SUFFIXES

#### Introduction

A **prefix** is a letter or letters attached to the front of a word or root to create a new word (for example, *disown*, *pretext*, *belittle*). A **suffix** is a letter or letters attached to the end of a word or root to create a new word (for example, helpful, manageable).

By adding prefixes and suffixes to existing words, you can vastly expand your vocabulary. Learning the meanings of prefixes and suffixes will also help you to piece together the meanings of some unfamiliar words.

While you are reading, you can often figure out a word you don't know by breaking it down into its parts. For example, suppose you come across the word *inability* in your reading. You can decode the word by breaking it down into three parts (*in-abili-ty*):

1. in-, a prefix meaning "not" or "the opposite of"

2. -abili-, from able, a word meaning "having enough power or skill to do something"

3. -ty, a suffix meaning "a condition or quality"

When you look at the word parts, you realize that *inability* means "the condition of not having enough power or skill to do something."

The chart below lists several common prefixes and suffixes and explains what they mean. Study the chart so you can recall these meanings when you are reading a textbook or story. Knowledge of prefixes and suffixes will save you a lot of time when you are trying to decode words as you read.


